<u>Erewash Voluntary Action CVS – Erewash Small Grant</u> <u>Scheme</u>

Derbyshire County Council Public Health, Derbyshire County Council Adult Care Services and Erewash Borough Council fund the Erewash Small Grant Scheme.

Community groups and organisations can apply for up to £1,500.

The Erewash Small Grant Scheme has three priority themes and applicants must meet at least one of the themes to be eligible to apply. The priority themes include:

- Health Inequalities
- Community Wellness
- > Building Resilience

Applications can be made by voluntary or community groups with a constitution, registered charity or charitable incorporated organisation, community interest company or social enterprise, other not for profit and parish councils.

The grant scheme is not open to statutory organisations.

Derbyshire County Council – Covid 19 Grants

Derbyshire County Council have re-launched the Covid-19 Community Fund which will run until the end of March 2023.

Funding available is up to £2,000 for constituted groups and £250 for non-constituted groups.

The funding is aimed at community and voluntary sector organisations whose work can meet one of the below:

- support to increase COVID-19 vaccination uptake
- protect people most vulnerable to COVID-19
- increase mental health and wellbeing and support individual and community resilience
- promote safer behaviours to reduce future risk of infection

The criteria of the fund has been amended to match the 'Living with Covid' guidance. This may mean that organisations who have previously been rejected from the fund may find that they are now eligible and are more than welcome to submit a new application.

GSK Impact Awards

The GSK IMPACT Awards provide core funding and free training for charities doing excellent work to improve people's health and wellbeing. Organisations must be at least three years old, working in a health-related field in the UK, with income between £120,000 and £3 million.

Up to 15 awards will be made, ranging from £4,000 to £50,000, plus free training and development valued at a further £9,500. Organisations will also have a film made and receive help with press and publicity. The GSK IMPACT Awards are funded by GSK and managed in partnership with The King's Fund. They are judged by a prestigious panel of judges and provide national recognition for the winning organisations.

They also give organisations access to a free leadership programme, designed specifically for health charities, provided by The King's Fund. After taking part in the

training, organisations can then join our network of health charities which supports ongoing service and organisational development.

The 2023 GSK IMPACT Awards application process has moved to a two-stage process this year.

The closing date for Stage 1 application is Thursday 1 September 2022.

Groundwork - Enterprise Development Programme

Groundwork has joined the Enterprise Development Programme (EDP) as an Environmental Partner to support charities and social enterprises operating in the environment sector to become more sustainable. Organisations are invited to apply for the programme to receive tailored support to help grow their business or enterprise.

Groundwork will work closely alongside a cohort of environmental organisations to help them to develop a package of support including: -

- Access to a bespoke learning package co-designed by organisations and Groundwork
- The opportunity for financial support to put learning into action
- Peer-learning and networking opportunities with other participants
- Access to pro bono legal and financial expertise
- Valuable information about the world of social enterprise from leading experts.

The EDP is developed and funded by Access – The Foundation for Social Investment and managed by Social Investment Business (SIB). It provides a broad range of support for charities and social enterprises working in certain sectors in England, helping them to expand or upscale their existing business or enterprise model and ways of working.

The programme will run until April 2024 with Groundwork supporting around 60 organisations on their enterprise journey.

The Finnis Scott Foundation

UK charities and charitable organisations, including schools and colleges, are eligible to apply for grants to support projects in the areas of horticulture, plant

sciences, fine art and art history.

The Foundation is especially interested in supporting horticultural training through bursaries and apprenticeships. Applications should be made by sponsoring institutions, individuals may not apply.

The Foundation will consider applications for one-off grants up to £10,000, but because of the high demand, most grants are currently £5,000 or less. Exceptionally, when funds permit, grants of as much as £60,000 are made, payable over several years.

Climate Action Fund – National Lottery Community Fund

The National Lottery Community Fund are looking for projects that focus on the link between nature and climate. They want to fund projects that use nature to encourage more community-led climate action. Projects must bring other important social and economic benefits e.g. The creation of strong, resilient and healthy communities or the development of 'green' skills and jobs.

The NLCF are interested in projects that can do at least one of the following: •

- show how creating a deeper connection with nature will lead to changing people's behaviours and greater care for the environment
- show how by bringing nature back into the places we live and work, we can help communities to reduce or adapt to the impacts of climate change.

The NLCF want all the projects funded to be creative, include everyone and try out new things. Projects also need to show how they can achieve longer-term, larger change that goes beyond the communities they are directly working with.

Applications will be accepted from either: • local partnerships • UK-wide partnerships which are delivered across at least two UK countries (England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales).

The programme will provide grants of up to £1.5 million over 2 to 5 years, with most projects between £300,000 and £500,000. The NLCF are looking to fund between 12 and 15 projects. Development grants of £50,000 to £150,000 are also available over 12 to 18 months.

Grants of between £10,000 and £50,000 are available for projects costed at more than £100,000 including VAT. Also considered are projects that introduce kitchens and accessible toilets to enable increased community use where the cost is more than £30,000 including VAT.

All grants will represent a maximum of 50% of the project cost.

Healthy Heart Grant – East Midlands

Central England Co-operative - Dividend Fund

Grants of between £100 and £5,000 are available for projects that aim to develop and improve communities.

Youth Music - Trailblazer Fund

Grants of up to £30,000 are available to organisations in England for projects that support children and young people facing barriers to make, learn and earn in music.

The funding is made available through the Youth Music Trailblazer fund which supports organisations who want to trial work for the first time, test a new way of working, or disrupt the status quo - or all three.

To be eligible for support applications must meet one of the following themes:

- Early years
- Disabled, d/Deaf and neurodivergent young people
- Youth justice system
- Young people facing barriers
- Young adults
- Organisations and the workforce.

Organisations less than one year old can apply for a maximum grant of £15,000.

A minimum of 10% match funding is required.

<u>Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport - Youth</u> Investment Fund

Local authorities and other not-for-profit organisations can apply for a share of £368 million in funding to create, expand and improve local youth facilities and services currently on offer to young people in underserved areas of England.

The funding, which is being made available through phase two of the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport's Youth Investment Fund and is being delivered by Social Investment Business. The fund is open to bids from 45 local authorities and over 600 district wards to build or refurbish up to 300 youth facilities over the next 3 years that represent value for money, are environmentally sustainable and enable positive activities for young people aged 11–18 (up to 25 for young people with SEND).

Expressions of interest should be submitted in the first instance.

The Elephant Trust

The Trust offers grants to artists and for new, innovative visual arts projects. It aims to make it possible for artists and those presenting their work to undertake and complete projects when confronted by lack of funds.

The Trust supports projects that develop and improve the knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the fine arts. Priority is given to artists and small organisations and galleries making or producing new work or exhibitions.

The Trust normally awards grants of up to £2,000, but larger grants of up to £5,000 may be considered.

Peter Cruddas Foundation

The Peter Cruddas Foundation provides funding for projects that benefit disadvantaged and disengaged young people in England and Wales.

The Foundation gives priority to programmes calculated to help disadvantaged young people (16 - 30) in the UK towards pathways into education, training and employment.

There is no minimum or maximum amount and projects can be funded for more than one year. Priority is given to applicants able to demonstrate that they can manage the amount they have applied for and how they intend to continue (if appropriate) after the funding has been spent.

Please note that the Foundation is not accepting applications for Capital Projects.

Eligible applicants will be charities registered with the charity commission in England and Wales benefitting people living in England and Wales.

<u>Derbyshire County Council Members Community</u> <u>Leadership Scheme</u>

Each County Councillor usually has £3,860 to give to local groups, this year an additional £3,860 has been allocated bringing their total to £7,720. Next year councillors will receive £3,860 plus £1,500 Platinum Fund to give local groups organising activities to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Groups seeking funding should contact their local county councillor to explain the nature of the project, amount sought, what other funding is available and how it will benefit the community.

Erewash Borough Council - Members Grant Scheme

For the 2021/22 financial year, each Erewash councillor has £250 award to organisations within their ward (where applicable some Councillors will have an additional amount available to them as a result of carrying forward unallocated grant funding from 2020/21). It is for each councillor to determine which project(s) or

organisation(s) they wish to support. The scheme allows a wide degree of flexibility in the type of project a councillor may support and the amount (minimum £50) they wish to allocate, subject to approval.

Activities that complement the council's draft core priorities:

- A safe, clean and welcoming borough
- Improved access to services
- Delivering efficient and effective services that residents need
- Creating opportunities for economic growth and prosperity
- A well run and efficient council

•

Organisations (including registered charities, community and voluntary groups, Community Interest Companies, Social Enterprises) within the councillor's own ward, or councillors may join together to support a project covering two (or more) wards.

- Councillors can allocate the entire £250 to one organisation, but where multiple organisations are to be awarded funding, there is a minimum award of £50 per organisation.
- · Capital purchase items.
- Match funding for a project. Funding will be agreed but not allocated until the applicant confirms that all match funding is in place.

The scheme is administered by the council's Community Engagement Officer, colin.handley@erewash.gov.uk However, organisations are advised that EBC Councillors are responsible for fully completing and signing grant application forms before they are submitted to the Community Engagement Officer.

Foundation Derbyshire - The Police and Crime Commissioner Community Investment Fund

Derbyshire Police and Crime Commissioner Angelique Foster has launched a second round of funding from her Anti-Social Behaviour Prevention Grant worth £100,000. These could include sports and creative arts diversionary programmes, radio/film-making activities, drop-ins for young people, CCTV, community clean-ups, intergenerational schemes, mentoring projects, education initiatives and parental support programmes.

Commissioner Foster is eager to support projects that take positive action against anti-social behaviour, in particular those that wish to offer some diversionary activity programmes over the summer holiday period.

Grants of up to £5000 will be allocated to successful applicants who can show evidence of how they will make a difference to Derby and Derbyshire's communities

The second is 1st July to 30th September.

Coalfields Regeneration

Grants of up to £2,000 are available to help organisations support those in crisis. Funding Reminders

National Lottery Heritage Fund - Heritage Innovation Fund

Grants of up to £25,000 are available to public and not-for-profit organisations, local authorities and private owners of heritage for projects to explore, test and grow new ways of working across the heritage sector.

The funding, along with six months of support, will allow organisations to test and grow new ways of working within the heritage workforce.

Applications are currently being accepted for the Explore phase which aims to define clearly stated problems within the workforce that will help to develop solutions for the testing phase.

FCC Communities Foundation – Community Action Fund

The FCC Community Action Fund provides grants of between £2,000 and £100,000 to not-for-profit organisations for amenity projects eligible under Object D of the Landfill Communities Fund (LCF). The Fund supports the provision, maintenance or improvement of community facilities.

Only applications for projects sited within 10 miles of an eligible FCC Environment waste facility can be accepted, you can check if you are located near an eligible site by clicking Apply and completing the pre-application eligibility check.

Applications from the following types or organisations can be made:

- Registered Charity which operates a community facility
- A Church or Parochial Church Council
- A Parish or Town Council or a Management Committee or User Association acting on behalf of a Parish or Town Council
- A Local Authority
- A CASC Registered Sports Club

The FCC Community Action Fund is oversubscribed, and types of projects are limited as to what is funded and paid for. Plan your application, download and read the Guide for Applicants or click on Apply and follow the pre-application eligibility check.

All grants require applicants to secure a contributing third party (CTP) payment. This is a very specific payment required to be paid to the landfill operator and should not be confused with match funding.

<u>Capital Fund - Re-opening of Derbyshire Environmental</u> <u>Trust's Grant Programme</u>

The Derbyshire Environmental Trust (DET) is repeating its own funding scheme in 2022. In recognition of the slightly longer period between funding rounds and its 25th Anniversary the Trust has more than doubled the available funding for one year only.

Up to £100,000 in total is available for distribution to a number of projects. The maximum award is £25,000 and the minimum £2,500.

This year there are two key changes to the assessment criteria in that the Trust will consider environmental impact and carbon reduction and energy efficiency, with a preference not to support projects reliant on fossil fuels where alternatives are an option. In addition to the other funding criteria, which remain unchanged from recent years, the Trust will also take note of the level of deprivation in the area of the project this year.

The closing date for applications is 3 October 2022 with decisions in December 2022 or January 2023.

Power to Change - Powering Up Programme

Power to Change is to reopen its Powering Up Programme to support community businesses across England to develop and grow their leadership skills and their organisations. This round will support up to twenty organisations that are looking to deliver changes within their business to help them to become more environmentally sustainable, and up to twelve businesses looking to learn how digital skills could help their business develop and grow.

The Powering Up programme offers a tailored support package for each community business and is worth up to £20,000 in total, this can be drawn down over a 12-month period. It includes:

- Paid access to technical and business support providers (up to £9,000) who are brokered in to meet the specific needs of your community business
- Professional development and wellbeing support (up to £3,000) such as leadership coaching, peer mentoring, team building and mental health support.

An £8,000 unrestricted grant to support you as a community business leader, and your team, to engage in the required support of the programme. This could be to cover your time, back fill a post, purchase essential equipment, or cover other expenditure that supports development and resilience of your community business.

The programme has a cross-cutting theme of diversity, equity and inclusion. Priority will be given to applications from areas of England facing high levels of deprivation, and organisations supporting or led by Minority Ethnic communities.

The closing date for applications is the 19 September 2022.

<u>UnLtd</u>

Grants plus business support are available to social entrepreneurs that are looking to start or grow an existing social venture. The funding is being made available through the UnLtd the leading provider of support to social entrepreneurs in and around the UK.

The grants are being made available through two funding streams:

- Grants of up to £15,000 to grow an existing social enterprise
- Grants of up to £5,000 to start a new social enterprise.

UnLtd are committed to providing 50% of their awards to Black, Asian and minority ethnic social entrepreneurs, and/or disabled social entrepreneurs.

To be eligible applicants need to be:

Mutual Aid Fund

Grants are available for mutual aid groups across the UK to support capacity building and sustainability projects that address the distinct challenges in adapting to a post-COVID environment. Grants of between £1,500 and £5,000 are available.

Funding is for projects and activities that meet all the following criteria:

- Clearly helps a group adapt post-COVID.
- Demonstrates a key contribution to a group's sustainability.
- Be completed within nine months.

- Piloting a programme that would help secure more sustainable sources of funding.
- Creating the capacity to design and implement a strategy/programme that would contribute to the sustainability of the group, including paying an existing group member or hiring a consultant.
- Buying equipment necessary for the sustainability of the group, such as fridges for a food

<u>Motability – Community Transport Grant Programme</u>

In 2022 Motability are launching six new grant programmes to help to address the challenges that disabled people face accessing transport. The Community Transport Grant Programme was launched on 1st April 2022.

The Community Transport Grant Programme will focus on:

- Funding support for staff or volunteer training and costs.
- Funding to increase the number of vehicles available in the community to help organisations support disabled people.
- Funding local, regional, or national initiatives to increase awareness of community transport and influence its inclusion in transport strategy and policy.
- Funding to schemes, programmes and initiatives that already exist, and who provide best practice solutions, but need further support to remain operational or scale up the service they can provide to help more disabled people.

Who can apply:

- Medium and large charities and organisations
- Annual income of at least £150,000 per annum
- Other types of formally constituted organisations such as Community Interest Companies, provided they have a charitable purpose and support disabled people with their transport needs.

The minimum grant value for this programme is £100,000, and the maximum grant value is £4,000,000

Applications can be submitted at any time until March 2025.

Magic Little Grants 2022

Magic Little Grants 2022 has now launched. They will be awarding £500 grants to 2,650 charitable organisations on Localgiving. This year funding can go towards any of the following projects:

- Improving mental wellbeing

- Supporting marginalised groups and promoting equality

Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust - Sustainable Futures Fund

The Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust recognises that climate change caused by human activity is threatening the well-being of humanity and that the wealthiest countries and individuals are responsible for a disproportionate share of emissions, whilst the poorest countries and sections of society are the most vulnerable to the impacts of climate change.

In order to tackle this issue, the Sustainable Futures fund focuses grant making on:

- Identifying the true costs and risks of resource depletion, climate change and other environmental problems
- Campaigns, initiatives and work that promote alternatives to consumerism
- Campaigns and movements that give a voice to young activists and marginalised groups on issues of economic and environmental justice.

Grants are available from a few hundred pounds to over £100,000 and may be single payments or spread over up to three years.

Funding priorities are:

- Better economics with grants funding work that explores how sustainability rather than traditional forms of economic growth.
- Beyond consumerism funded work will include that which engages people individually and collectively in moving culture away from consumerism and towards more sustainable ways of living.
- New Voices funding for campaigns and movements that enable marginalised groups and young activists to have a voice in decisions which affect them.
- Responding to the dual harms of Covid-19 and systemic racism.

To apply, organisations need to register with the Trust's grants management system.

The deadline to register is the 28 October 2022 and the deadline to apply is 5pm on the 14 November 2022.
