The council has received Shared Prosperity Funding (SPF) from central government, to support its revised Fast Funding Community Grant scheme. Qualifying community organisations, including registered charities, voluntary organisations and social enterprises, are invited to apply for a grant of up to £1,500 to deliver a project or activity that will provide benefits for Erewash residents.

All applications must show how their project or activity will achieve one or both of the Fast-Funding Community Grant scheme's outcomes:

- Increased engagement (of at least 10%).
- Increased volunteering (of at least 10%).

<u>Erewash Voluntary Action CVS – Erewash Small Grant</u> Scheme

Derbyshire County Council Public Health, Derbyshire County Council Adult Care Services and Erewash Borough Council fund the Erewash Small Grant Scheme.

Community groups and organisations can apply for up to £1,500.

The Erewash Small Grant Scheme has three priority themes and applicants must meet at least one of the themes to be eligible to apply. The priority themes include:

- Health Inequalities
- Community Wellness
- Building Resilience

Applications can be made by voluntary or community groups with a constitution, registered charity or charitable incorporated organisation, community interest company or social enterprise and other not for profit organisations.

The grant scheme is not open to statutory organisations including Parish Councils.

Communities around East Midlands airport can apply for grants of up to £2,000 for projects that have a long-lasting community, social or environmental benefit.

Applications must meet at least one of the following objectives:

- provide help to community groups which are supporting vulnerable people during the Covid-19 outbreak.
- bring the community closer together through facilities for sport, recreation and other leisure-time activities.
- support young people to prepare for employment.
- offer environmental improvement and/or heritage conservation.
- improve awareness of environmental issues, and
- encourage and/or protect wildlife.

All 64 of our councillors get funding through the members' Community Leadership Scheme to give to communities and organisations in their area.

Groups seeking funding should contact their local county councillor to explain the nature of the project, amount sought, what other funding is available and how it will benefit the community.

National Lottery Community Fund - Awards for All England

Voluntary, community organisations and Schools, etc across the UK can now apply for grants of up to £20,000 from the National Lottery Community Fund – Awards for All programme. This represents a significant increase from the previous maximum grant size of £10,000. Projects can last for up to two years.

The funding boost is intended to support organisations in delivering new or existing community led activities. Eligible projects must achieve at least one of the following objectives:

- Bring people together to build strong relationships within and across communities
- Improve places and spaces that matter to communities
- Help individuals reach their potential by providing early support
- Assist individuals, communities, and organisations facing difficulties due to the cost-of-living crisis

Organisations eligible to apply include:

- Constituted voluntary or community organisations
- Constituted groups or clubs
- Registered charities
- Charitable incorporated organisations (CIOs)
- Not-for-profit companies
- Community interest companies (CICs)
- Schools (provided the project benefits and involves the surrounding communities)
- Statutory bodies (including local authorities, town, parish, and community councils)
- Community benefit societies

The application deadline is 16 weeks before the start of the project or activities.

<u>The Ironmongers Company – Supporting Disadvantaged</u> Children and Young People

The Ironmongers' Company want to support projects that provide opportunities for disadvantaged children and young people to fulfil their potential. Grants are only given to registered charities and projects must meet all of the following criteria:

- For children and young people under the age of 25 who are disadvantaged.
- Consist of educational activities that develop learning, motivational and skills.
- Have clear aims and objectives to be net within a [planned timescale.
- Are within the UK.

Projects must deliver clearly defined educational benefits to a specific group of children or young people.

Grants range from a few hundred pounds to around £10,000. The average grant awarded is £4,000. Grants must be spent within 12 months from the date of award.

SUEZ - Communities Fund

Not-for-profit organisations can apply for funding to deliver projects that improve communities and the environment.

The funding is made available through the SUEZ Communities Fund for projects that improve public amenities, repair religious or historic buildings, or support biodiversity in areas surrounding Suez landfill sites.

The maximum grant amount is:

• £50,000 for projects in England

Funding typically covers:

- Materials
- Equipment
- contractors for improvement work

The application deadline is the 15 May 2024 for England.

Youth Music - Catalyser Fund

Grants of between £30,001 and £300,000 are available to organisations in England that want to support children and young people facing barriers to make, learn and earn in music.

The Youth Music's Catalyser Fund will support organisations who want to make music activity more inclusive either by sustaining or scaling up their work or changing sector practice.

Children and young people should be involved in the planning and development of programmes that must focus on at least one of the following themes:

- Early years
- Disabled, d/Deaf and neurodivergent young people
- Youth justice system
- Young people facing barriers
- Young adults
- Organisations and the workforce.

The deadline for expressions of interest is 5pm on the 10 May 2024.

Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts Fund

Grants ranging from £90,000 to £300,000 are available to build the capacity of cultural organisations that use art to create positive social change, particularly amongst historically underfunded communities across the UK.

The Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts Fund provides core funding to arts organisations over three years, to increase their sustainability and to deepen the impact of their work.

The Foundation will fund up to 50% of an organisation's annual turnover.

Priority will be given to applications which are anti-racist and intersectional in their approach.

Youth Endowment Fund

A £3.5 million fund has been launched to evaluate the effectiveness of psychological therapies delivered to children across England and Wales, who are at risk of becoming involved in crime and violence or those already involved in the youth justice system.

The funding is being made available through the Youth Endowment Fund (YEF) - Psychological Therapies Fund, for projects that aim to treat psychological and emotional problems for children and young people aged 11 to 18, through one-to-one, group, online or phone delivery.

The YEF is aiming to identify around 2-3 projects that are ready for robust impact evaluation and can be delivered over a maximum 24-month period.

The funding is available to any organisation, including charities, public services or the private sector.

Priority will be given to projects supporting children from marginalised backgrounds.

Partnership applications are welcome.

20% match funding is required.

The closing date for applications is the 24 May 2024.

<u>Comic Relief – Safe and Supported Beyond Homelessness</u> <u>Funding Programme</u>

Comic Relief has launched a new funding opportunity for organisations specialising in supporting young people at risk of or experiencing homelessness in the UK.

The Every Step of the Way: Safe & Supported Beyond Homelessness funding programme offers grants of up to £200,000 over 3 to 5 years to support organisations to provide tailored, inclusive and accessible services, enabling young people aged 16 to 25 to access the right support at the right time.

This funding can be used to support service delivery as well as influencing and advocacy work.

Comic Relief encourages proposals that involve young people with lived experience.

Applications are accepted from organisations with an annual income of between £250,000 and £10 million.

The deadline for applications is 3pm on the 7 May 2024.

UnLtd

Grants plus business support are available to social entrepreneurs that are looking to start or grow an existing social venture. The funding is being made available through the UnLtd the leading provider of support to social entrepreneurs in and around the UK.

The grants are being made available through two funding streams:

- Grants of up to £18,000 to grow an existing social enterprise that has been operating between 1 and 4 years.
- Grants of up to £8,000 for social businesses not yet established or been running under a year.

To be eligible applicants need to be:

- Fulfil a clear need and demand
- Have clear outputs and goals

In addition to the Awards, UnLtd has two focus areas where they think social entrepreneurs can make a big difference. UnLtd has dedicated teams and specialist support available to social entrepreneurs with ideas to help people in the areas of:

- Healthy Aging
- Access to Employment

Triangle Trust 1949 Fund

The Triangle Trust 1949 Fund has announced its new grants strategy for 2024.

This year, the Trust is looking for projects focusing on vulnerable young women and girls across the UK who have been in the criminal justice system or who are at a high risk of entering it.

The aim of the funding is to either reduce the number of young women or girls who reoffend or reduce the number of those who receive a first conviction.

This funding opportunity will open on the 18 April 2024 with a view to awarding grants in the autumn.

Registered charities will have until the 23 May 2024 to submit their applications.

Edward Gostling Foundation - Capital Grant Programme

Capital grants of up to £250,000 are available to expand the capacity of UK registered charities and CIO's working to improve the quality of life for people in need, particularly those living on very low incomes who have a disability or long-term illness.

The funding is made available by the Edward Gostling Foundation through their Capital Grant Programme.

This programme encourages organisations to bring forward major capital projects costing £1 million or more that align with one or more of the foundation's funding themes.

The funding themes are:

- Health and wellbeing
- Independent living at home
- Respite
- Transition

These projects should build new capacity, promote sustainability, and bring about a step change in the way care is delivered.

Grants will vary depending on the size and scope of the project. Organisations must have at least 50% of the project's funding secured before submitting their application.

Applications are accepted from registered charities and charitable incorporated organisations with a minimum of 3 years filed accounts.

Applications can be submitted at any time. Decisions can take 90 days.

<u>Peter Harrison Foundation - Opportunities Through Sport</u> Grant Scheme.

Charities and Community Amateur Sports Clubs (CASCs) throughout the United Kingdom can apply to the Peter Harrison Foundation Opportunities Through Sport grant scheme. The aim of the grant scheme is to provide opportunities for sport and physical activity at a grassroots level that enable people who are physically, mentally, socially, or economically disadvantaged to develop personal and life skills to fulfil their potential.

The grants can be used for a variety of purposes, such as funding new sports programmes, improving existing sports facilities, or providing training and support for sports coaches.

The Trustees welcome applications for physical activity initiatives that:

- Provide a focus for skills development and confidence building
- Have a strong training and/or educational theme
- Provide specialised sporting equipment or facilities required to open opportunities
- Have a high degree of involvement from beneficiaries and those with lived experience
- Have a plan for sustainability and seek to deliver a lasting legacy

The Foundations provide two levels of funding:

- Major grants: between £5,001 and £30,000.
- Small grants: up to £5,000

Priority will be given to organisations with an annual turnover of up to £500,000.

Cooperative Bank - Customer Donation Fund

Organisations such as Registered Charities, Community Interest Companies, Cooperatives and Credit Unions; etc. that have a Community Directplus account can apply for funding of up to £1,000 from the Customer Donation Fund.

Since 2003 the Co-operative Bank Donation Fund has donated over £1,000,000 to over 1,100 local good causes. The money can be used to support special projects and fundraising activities; and all Community Directplus account holders are eligible to apply.

AB Charitable Trust

UK-registered charities that work towards combating abuse and violations of human rights can apply for grants of usually between £10,000 and £30,000 through the A B Charitable Trust. The A B Charitable Trust (ABCT) was set up in 1990 and supports unpopular causes that champion human dignity and focus on small and medium-sized charities working close to the ground.

Applications are particularly welcomed from charities working to support:

- migrants and refugees
- · criminal justice and penal reform
- human rights, particularly access to justice

The Trust generally makes one-off grants to charities registered and working in the UK with annual incomes of between £150,000 and £1.5m that do not have substantial investments or surpluses.

Grants range in size, with most grants awarded being in the range £10,000 to £30,000. ABCT does not normally fund charities with large national or international links.

The next closing date for applications is the 26 April 2024.

Access Folk - Small Project Grants Programme

Groups and individuals in England can apply for grants of up to £1,000 to deliver events and activities that encourage participation in folk singing.

The funding will support events that increase and diversify participation, particularly amongst groups that are currently marginalised or underrepresented in England's folk scene.

Two funding streams are available:

- Starting a new group, intended for new organisers
- Developing access in an existing group, for groups who are interested in making changes to the events they already run

Six new groups and six existing groups will be supported.

The types of costs that could be supported include:

- venue hire
- promotional materials
- structural changes to an established venue
- paying musicians or organisers themselves

The funding is made available through the Access Folk Small Project Grants programme which closes to applications on the 31 May 2024.

Lloyds Bank Foundation - Racial Equity Fund

Charities and CICs led by and for Black, Asian, and minority ethnic (BAME) communities will soon be able to apply for funding to help people experiencing economic inequity because of their race or ethnicity.

The Lloyds Bank Foundation Racial Equity Fund will offer three-year unrestricted grants of up to £75,000 alongside development support to enable organisations to provide immediate and long-term support to help people from BAME communities break free from poverty.

The funding will support around forty organisations in England and Wales (outside of London) that understand the complexity of the issues people face and give them complete flexibility to use the funding however they see fit.

Organisations must have an annual income of between £25,000 and £500,000.

The closing date for applications is 5pm on the 30 May 2024.

Biffa Award

Biffa Award has launched a new funding round through its Biffa Award Partnership Grants scheme. Grants of between £250,000 and £1,000,000 are available for:

Built Environment: projects should restore, modernise and/or improve facilities such as cultural, heritage or visitor centres. The facility should be inclusive and promote learning, curiosity and participation to large numbers of visitors on a national scale.

Natural Environment: projects should restore and/or improve the environment and the natural systems or habitats that support it. Projects should be working to Biodiversity 2020: A Strategy for England's Wildlife and Ecosystem Services, its predecessor or a Local Biodiversity Action Plan.

Preference will be given to projects in which Biffa Award is the majority funder; which work in partnership with other organisations; and which engage with the public.

To be eligible for funding the applicant organisation and project must be eligible for enrolment and registration with the scheme regulator, ENTRUST. This will be a condition of any grant approved. Each project site must be within 15 miles of a

significant Biffa operation or active Biffa landfill site. Each project site must also within 10 miles of any licensed landfill site.

The closing date for submitting an online Expressions of Interest is noon on the 31 May 2024.

FCC Community Foundation

Registered Charities, churches, Parish Councils, Local Authorities and CASC registered sports clubs can apply for grants of between £2,000 and £100,000 for the provision, maintenance or improvement of community facilities.

This can include:

- Village Halls and Community Centres
- Public Play Areas
- Publicly available Multi use games areas
- Skate parks and BMX tracks
- Sport and recreation grounds including pavilions and clubhouses with full public access
- Churches community spaces only
- Nature Reserves
- Public gardens, parks, country parks and woodlands with at least dawn to dusk access
- Museums

The funding is being made available through the FCC Community Action Fund and is available to projects located within 10 miles of an eligible FCC Environment site.

Recent changes to its funding policy mean that the FCC Community Foundation will now accept applications for renewable energy projects based at community buildings, including solar panels. Applications for non-substantial extensions such as porches, storage areas and toilets/kitchens will in some circumstances will now also be accepted.

All grants require applicants to secure a <u>contributing third party (CTP) payment.</u> This is a very specific payment required to be paid to the landfill operator and should not be confused with match funding.

The Matthew Good Foundation

The Matthew Good Foundation has opened the next round of its Grants for Good Fund. The aim is to support small charities, not-for-profit groups and social entrepreneurs who are passionate about making a difference to people, their community or the environment.

The Fund will share £15,000 between five shortlisted projects every three months, which will be voted for by John Good Group employees. The project that receives the most votes will receive a grant of £5,000, second place £3,500, third place £2,500 with fourth and fifth place both receiving £2,000.

As well as established projects and charities, the Foundation wants to hear from people with innovative ideas that need some funding to get their projects up and running.

To be eligible, applicants will have to have had an income of less than £50,000 in the last 12 months.

<u>Tesco and The Sun Offer 150 One-off Grants Through the</u> Footie for All Fund

Tesco and The Sun newspaper have joined together to provide a funding pot of £150,000. The fund is to encourage more children and young people to take up football or improve access to the game.

The grants are part of The Sun's Footie for All campaign. The fund is to highlight how financial struggles are forcing young people to give up football.

The funding is designed to provide support to grassroots football organisations working with children under the age of 18. The funding is to enable clubs and groups to continue to deliver activities that allow local young people to take part.

Constituted not-for-profit grassroots football clubs can apply for grants of up to £1,000 which will support 100% of project costs.

The funding can be used to assist clubs in improving facilities, purchasing equipment and new kits, and meeting any other needs.

The deadline for applications is 30 April 2024.

Funding Reminders

Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust

Refurbishment Grants programme The Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust is delivering the Veterans' Capital Housing Fund on behalf of the Office for Veterans' Affairs. The Veterans' Capital Housing Fund supports projects that contribute to the wider aim of ending veterans' homelessness by providing affordable and viable homes for veterans.

Under this programme, the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust will award grants of up to £75K, on behalf of the Office for Veterans Affairs, towards projects that assist in the refurbishment or extension of rental accommodation that will offer high quality support for veterans with a housing need.

Eligibility – To be eligible for this funding, you must be one of the following:

- A registered charity that can show it works with veterans or
- A registered social housing provider that can show it works with veterans.

This is a refurbishment grant programme for capital projects that will support refurbishment and/or extension of accommodation for veterans. You can apply for grants of up to £75k for capital refurbishments projects lasting up to one year. We anticipate that most grants will be below £40k.

Themes and priorities – We want to support projects that need help to refurbish existing housing for veterans. This could be transitional or permanent housing. You can apply to this programme if your project will:

- enable refurbishments of existing affordable homes for rent to veterans
- enable refurbishments of sites that increase the availability of veteran housing
- · ensure properties meet decent homes and energy efficiency standards

A strong application will show how the project will contribute to the aims of the government's ambition to reduce veteran homelessness and end rough sleeping, who you would work with to deliver the project and how the benefits of the work would contribute to the overall aims of this programme.

Bernard Sunley Foundation

Grants are available to charities, specialist schools, CIOs, and other not-for-profit organisations including scout and guide groups, and housing associations, that are working to raise the quality of life for people in England and Wales.

The Bernard Sunley Foundation aims to provide greater opportunities for the young, elderly, disabled, and disadvantaged by supporting capital projects in the areas of:

- Community
- Education
- Health
- Social welfare

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The types of projects that could be supported include:

- improvements to village halls
- supporting children and adults with special educational and learning needs
- improvements to hospices and treatment clinics

The Foundation offers three levels of grants. These are large grants of £20,000 and above; medium grants of up to £20,000 and small grants of £5,000 and under. Charities registered in the UK and working to offer sanctuary, rehoming and rehabilitation to animals in the UK and/or internationally can apply for grants of up to £35,000. Organisations involved with the conservation of wildlife, the rescue, rehabilitation and (where possible) release of animals are also eligible to apply.

The funding supports general running costs or capital purchases. The Trust encourages repeat applications from charities when further financial support might be given if funds allow.

Rowing Foundation

Organisations, clubs, and schools involved in rowing can apply for grants of between £500 and £4,000 (up to 50% of the overall cost of the project) from the Rowing Foundation to support junior & student rowers, and adaptive rowing for all ages.

These grants are intended for groups who may have small funding requirements or be ineligible for other sources of funding such as the National Lottery.

The Rowing Foundation focuses on providing equipment such as boats, sculls, ergos, oars, and safety gear to encourage the participation of young people and the disabled in rowing.

The funding is being made available through two funding programmes:

- Equipment grants
- Refurbishment grants

To be eligible for funding, the projects or work must be non-elitist, for public benefit, and aim to benefit young people, those in education, or people with disabilities.

The next application deadline for equipment grants is the 20 May 2024. Applications for refurbishment grants can be made at any time.

Operating / Core Costs

Capital Projects

Through the Capital Projects grant programme the foundation provides funding of no more than 10% of a total project cost. However, for local community projects (e.g. village halls, community centres, places of worship, etc.), grants are unlikely to be over £30,000 regardless of the project size.

Woodward Charitable Trust - Summer Playschemes

Each year the Trustees of the Woodward Charitable Trust set aside funds for summer playschemes for children from disadvantaged backgrounds between the ages of 5-16 years.

Trustees only fund programmes that run for a minimum of 2 weeks, 10 full days or 20 half days across the summer holidays.

Trustees will only fund up to 50% of the total cost of a scheme. Most grants awarded are in the range of £500 to £1,000. Around 35 grants are made each year.

Preference is given to:

- Small local playschemes that provide a wide-ranging programme of activities.
 Trustees prefer activities that are relatively inexpensive such as crafts and cooking, as well as outdoor activities and sport.
- Schemes that involve a large number of children.

Schemes where past users are encouraged to come back and help as volunteers.

Big Bike Revival Programme

Local volunteer led-groups, social enterprises, and other not-for-profit organisations can apply for grants of up to £3,500 to deliver cycling events to get people back on their bikes this summer.

The Big Bike Revival Programme will support organisations across England to deliver a summer programme of activity that will encourage people who do not currently cycle regularly (once every two weeks or less) to consider either starting or returning to cycling.

This includes people experiencing:

- social, economic and health deprivation
- people from diverse backgrounds
- those facing multiple challenges

The programme supports three types of events:

- Learn to fix events offers basic services to repair cycles and provides essential checks to ensure cycles are safe to ride
- Learn to ride sessions offers instruction, training or skills for adults to learn to maintain or repair their cycle or learn cycle skills to help them feel safer when cycling
- Ride events offers led rides for adults to practise cycling locally

The funding, which is made available by the Department for Transport, can be spent on anything that supports the delivery of events such as staffing costs, consumables and venue or location hire.

The closing date for applications is the 25 June 2024.

Village Halls Small Grants Fund

Defra funded grant scheme reopens for those managing rural community buildings. This is managed by ACRE who have also announced a new Chief Executive

This round has a lower award threshold of £2,000 to support smaller projects and make it accessible to more groups.

The grant fund has re-opened to new applicants who wish to undertake smaller projects such as disability access, toilet upgrades and new kitchens. Grant awards of between £2,000 to £5,000, and up to 20 per cent of eligible project costs, are on offer. Project expenditure must take place before 31 March 2025.

<u>Action with Communities in Rural England - Platinum</u> <u>Jubilee Village Hall Improvement Grant Fund</u>

Village halls across England can apply for grants to improve and modernise their facilities.

Launched by the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022, the Platinum Jubilee Village Hall Improvement Grant Fund will provide capital only grants of up to £5,000 for capital improvement projects to create welcoming spaces that encourage more people to make use of their village halls and bring people together.
